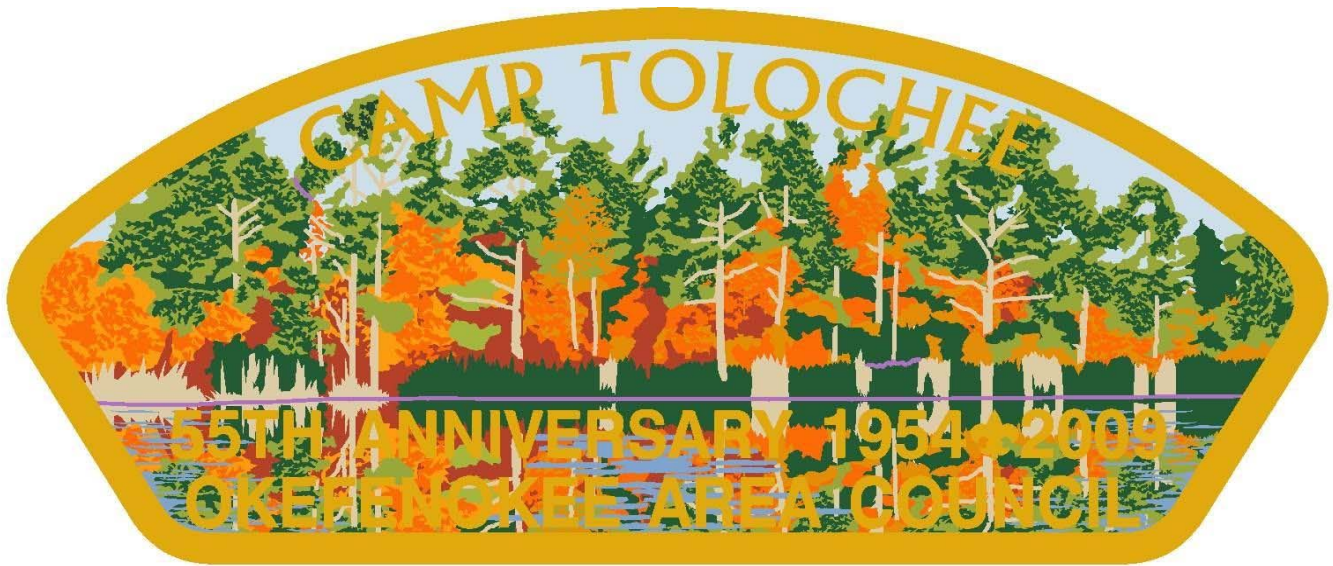

**Campsite Deposits:** A \$100.00 deposit is required for site selection at summer camp. This fee is not refundable, but is applied to the overall cost for camp. In the event the troop does not attend camp, the fee may be put toward the camp fee of one boy attending. A troop will lose its deposit if it does not attend camp that year. When the unit pays the final camp fees deduct the deposit from the fee total before you pay.

**Youth Camp Fees:** A camp patch is included in the fee for each Scout listed on the Unit Summer Camp Roster when submitted and paid in full by May 20, 2009

**Camperships:** The Council has limited Camperships available for Okefenokee Area Council Scouts who need assistance in paying their camp fee. If you have a Scout who may qualify for a campership, submit a request indicating circumstances and a \$50.00 deposit towards their summer camp fee. All campership requests are due by April of the year attending. **Priority consideration will be given to those Scouts who participate in the Council Popcorn and Scout savings card fund raising events.**

**Leader's Fees:** A Camp patch is included in the fee for each adult listed on the Unit Summer Camp Roster when submitted and paid in full.

**Provisional Scouts:** If you have a Scout who cannot attend camp with your troop, or wishes to attend a different week, a provisional troop is available so they can enjoy the same program as other Scouts.

**Minor children:** Are not allowed to accompany their parent/guardian for extended overnight periods at camp.

**All fees are non-refundable but transferable:** Unused fees cannot be applied toward the balance due of others unless there are extenuating circumstances out of the control of the Scout or Scouter. Those circumstances are, but not limited to death of self or family member, sickness or moved out of the area. PLEASE NOTE homesickness is not an extenuating circumstance.

**Camp Leadership:** Each unit is required to provide a minimum of two adult leaders in camp at all times. Both camp leaders must be registered with the BSA and one must be at least 21 years old. **All of the adults in camp must have current Youth Protection training.** Adult leaders also need to be current in training for safe swim defense and safety afloat.

**Heath Forms:** A health history updated within the past 12 months and a physical examination conducted within the past 36 months by using the BSA physical form No. **34414** from the end of camp week is required for each youth camper and adult under 40 years of age. A copy of the physical examination must be attached to the health history. Youth & Adults taking SCUBA Certification and Adults 40 years of age and older must have completed a physical examination within 12 months from the completion of camp week by using BSA Class 3 physical form **34412**.

**Merit Badge Pre-Registration:** This year, we're proud to introduce our new ONLINE REGISTRATION for merit badges. After your payment has been received, we will mail your online login and password.

**Pets:** BSA policy does not allow pets to be brought into camp.

**Family Night:** Parents, friends and families are invited to camp on Friday night for Family Night. Visitors may arrive beginning at 5:00 p.m. The activities include supper and an Order of the Arrow campfire program. The Cost for supper is \$5.00 per person (children 6 and under \$3.00). Meal tickets must be purchased at the Trading Post.

**Trading Post:** The camp maintains a full service Scout Store. It is usually open throughout the day and during special events. Items such as candy, drinks, sundries, personal items, required program items such as merit badge books and crafts are available. Additionally we stock items like camp stools, compasses, Scout knives, and axes, as well as T-shirts, cups, patches and uniforms. **(History tells us to plan on your Scout spending a minimum of \$50.00 in the Trading Post during his week at camp!)**

**Uniforming:** The Scout uniform is the biggest contributor to the Scouting spirit. The camp staff encourages all Scouts and Leaders to follow the uniform code of Field Uniforms to Vespers, evening meals, check-in/out, and campfires. The Activity Uniform of Scouts and Scouters is a Boy Scout T-shirt, Scout shorts, belt and socks which are worn at all other times.

**Leaving Camp:** Scouts and Leaders should have no reason to leave camp except for emergencies. All participants and visitors must sign in/out in the Visitors Log located at the Silver Beaver Admin bldg. A Scout can leave camp ONLY under the direction of an adult and ONLY after receiving approval from the Camp Director. A Camper Release Form will be required prior to the Scout leaving camp.

**Vehicles in Camp:** No personal vehicles are allowed past the parking lot. Troop trailers may be taken to the campsite, dropped off and the tow vehicle immediately returned to the parking lot. A camp trailer/shuttle will be available for transportation of equipment to and from the parking lot.

**Troop Arrival:** Troop arrival and check in will be from **8:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. on the Monday** of your scheduled week. **All youth and leaders are to be present before the unit can check in.**

**Boy Scout Tobacco Free Policy:** It is the responsibility of the Boy Scouts of America to protect the health and safety of the young people in our program. It is the policy of the Boy Scouts of America that **no tobacco products shall be used in the presence of youth members.** In addition, extreme care should be exercised to provide smoke-free environments for all Scouting participants. All buildings, facilities, and program areas under control of the council are designated as non-smoking facilities and areas. Smoking outside entrance/exit door is not permitted at any location. In addition, all Scouting functions, meetings, and activities are conducted on a tobacco free basis with permitted smoking areas located away from all participants.

**Medical Emergencies and Insurance:** A health lodge is provided with a qualified health officer on duty. For illnesses and injuries, which require a doctor, the health officer will arrange transportation with appropriate professional help. A local camp physician is on call 24 hours a day. All insurance claims are handled through each camper's personal or troop insurance coverage. Campers must bring their insurance card numbers and name of carrier. Scoutmasters should have health forms and insurance information at camp.

**If your Scout has a food allergy, please provide us with a list of what he can eat as well as what he cannot eat as soon as possible. We must receive this information before your Scout comes to camp so we can ensure we have the proper food.**

### **ITEMS SCOUTS ARE TO LEAVE AT HOME:**

Fixed-Blade sheath knives, Firearms and ammunition, Fireworks, TVs, Radios, tape players  
Bicycles and Electronic Games (i.e. Game Boys, etc.), Cell phones.

### **OTHER CAMP GUIDELINES:**

1. No fires or flames are allowed in tents.
2. Intentional vandalism to camp, unit, or personal property is grounds for immediate dismissal.
3. Alcoholic beverages or drugs are not permitted.
4. If firearms or bows are brought for program purposes, they must be immediately turned over to the Shooting Sports Director upon arrival. They will be locked up and maintained by the Camp until unit departure. We do not have facilities for firearms greater than .22 caliber. The camp cannot be held responsible for damage or loss of items brought into camp.
5. All liquid and gas fuels are to be used, filled, and stored under qualified adult supervision. No liquid fuel may be left in the campsite. The camp will provide facilities for fuel storage.

6. Open toed shoes are not allowed outside the immediate areas of the bath houses and aquatics activity areas.
7. Discipline is the responsibility of the adult troop leaders in camp. The staff will work with the leaders in resolving any problems that might arise.

### **PLANNING WITH YOUR TROOP:**

1. Make reservations by requesting the campsite your Troop wishes to use. Send your request with a \$100 deposit to the council office. There is no longer a roll over deposit but the \$100 deposit is applied toward the total cost of summer camp. (Aug.-Dec.)
2. Conduct a Summer Camp promotion using your experience and materials provided by the council office. Invite parents to this meeting so they can learn about summer camp. (Oct - Dec)
3. Determine your adult leadership needs and recruit them. Make sure all are current on Youth Protection training. (Dec – Feb)
4. Start collecting fees early from Scouts who plan to attend. Your goal is to have all qualified scouts committed and paid before the deadline to avoid the late fee. (Jan)
5. Determine your Troop, Scout's and Junior Leader's program needs and start developing a plan and activity schedule. Don't forget about those soon to be bridging Webelos Scouts! (Jan – April)
6. Make certain ALL Scouts and Leaders who will be attending have completed up-to-date medical/health evaluations. (May)
7. Finalize merit badge schedules and submit them to the program director. (May)

### **2009 Summer Camp Program Information**

The Camp Tolochee program is designed to assist the troop with their advancement program, not replace it. It is important to follow the plan and schedules to minimize over crowding and under-utilization of instructors and facilities. However, special needs and circumstances will be addressed on a case basis and will be accommodated whenever possible.

**“Trailhead” First Year Camper program:** Is designed for young Scouts in the first 6 months of Boy Scouts working on their Tenderfoot through First Class ranks. This program allows the Scout and his Leader to select the requirements he needs and participate in merit badge classes and troop activities. The unit will be provided a check-off sheet indicating those requirements that were taught and demonstrated proficiency. It will be the responsibility of the unit leader to sign requirements in the Boy Scout Handbook.

**Totin' Chip and Fireman Chit:** Classes are available at the Trailhead Program Area. Please arrange with the Trailhead Director for your training needs.

**Merit Badges:** Are for Scouts who are working toward rank advancement or specific skills and interests. All Scouts will need a merit badge book for each class. Merit badge books will be available at the Trading Post for purchase. Some merit badges can be finished in 2-3 days and some take the entire week. Pre-registration of merit badge classes will minimize over-crowding and under utilization of resources. Merit Badge books are required to complete the requirements and to earn the badge.

## **OLDER SCOUT PROGRAMS**

**PADI Open Water Diver:** Program is for older Scouts (15 and up) and Leaders. Participants must pass the BSA Swimmers test as well as the swimming, classroom, and practical requirements required for certification. A separate parental release is required for all participants under 18. Final certification will be determined by the course instructors. Participants must provide their own mask, fins and snorkel. All training books and other equipment will be provided by the instructors.

**BSA Lifeguard:** Program is for older Scouts (14 and up) and Leaders. Scouts must have previously earned Swimming, Rowing, First Aid, and Life Saving Merit Badges. They must also have completed and hold current CPR certification from an accredited agency. Adults are encouraged to take this course.

**BSA Snorkeling:** Open to all Scouts and Leaders who have passed the BSA Swimmers test. This is a progressive award. Lessons are conducted daily and you must attend scheduled sessions to complete the requirements. Participants must provide their own mask, snorkel, and flippers.

**Mile Swim:** This is a progressive award. To earn the Mile Swim Award, Scouts and Leaders must attend the scheduled sessions.

**Mile Run:** This is a progressive award. To earn the Mile Run Award, Scouts and Leaders must attend the scheduled sessions.

**World Conservation Award:** A Scout must earn Environmental Science, Citizenship in the World, and either Soil and Water Conservation or Fish and Wildlife Management merit badges to complete the requirements for this award.

**National Rifle Association (NRA) Rifle and Shotgun Qualifications:** Qualification will be available on a limited sign-up basis only. Participants will be required to spend “extra” time at the rifle and shotgun range to complete all of the requirements. Medals will be awarded on Friday.

**BSA Kayaking:** Using the camp kayaks you can complete the requirements for Kayaking BSA and earn the patch.

**High adventure off camp:** If you have scouts that have attended summer camp for a number of years and they see no value in attending, how about the high adventure program? They will leave camp on Monday and return Friday with stays on Cumberland Island, on the river, use a ropes course and mountain bikes. They will stay overnight at camp once during the week.

**Low COPE Course:** Your older scouts can form a patrol and complete the low cope course and learn team work and leadership.

## **ADULT LEADER ACTIVITIES**

**PADI Open Water Diver:** Participants must pass the BSA Swimmers test as well as the swimming, classroom, and practical requirements required for certification. Participants must provide their own mask, fins and snorkel. Final certification will be determined by the course instructors. All training books and other equipment will be provided by the instructors.

**Safe Swim Defense and Safety Afloat training:** All leaders should attend the training. Leaders will receive certification cards at the completion of the training.

**Skeet, Rifle, and Archery Shoots:** Leaders will have the opportunity to experience our Shooting Sports program. Open Shooting session ammunition tickets may be purchased at the Trading Post.

**National Rifle Association (NRA) Rifle and Shotgun Qualifications:** Qualification will be available on a limited sign-up basis only. Participants will be required to spend “extra” time at the rifle and shotgun range to complete all of the requirements. Medals will be awarded on Friday.

**Leader’s Events:** Various fun and unusual events will be conducted throughout the week for leaders to participate in. Details will be passed on to the unit leader at the Leader’s meetings.

**Trailhead and Program Area:** Assistance from leaders is welcomed and often needed. They provide valuable experience and skill to the program. Contact the program director for more information.

**Campsite Inspection:** Leaders may be asked to assist in conducting daily campsite inspections. This will provide the leaders the opportunity to experience and share ideas with other units.

**Merit Badge Mentoring:** Leaders will be asked to help monitor and mentor the merit badge classes. In an attempt to fix an age old problem, certain merit badge classes will be designated a mentoring class and adult leaders will be asked to assist.

**Scoutmaster merit badge:** How often does an adult leader feel bored and wants to do something? Well, a scoutmaster merit badge is available for you to work on all week. The requirements will be passed out on Sunday evening and if you desire to work on it and finish it you will receive the badge at the Friday camp fire.

## **TROOP ACTIVITIES**

**Troop Swim:** Troops may sign up for a Troop Swim at the arrival Leader/SPL meeting. At least 1 qualified adult with current Safe Swim Defense training must attend at the pool.

**Flag Ceremonies:** Flag ceremonies will be held each day at 7:30 am and 6:00 pm at the main flagpole. Each Troop will have the opportunity to serve as color guard. The troop assignments will be determined at the SPL meetings. All troops are asked to be assembled at five minutes to the hour.

**Order of the Arrow:** All Scouts and Leaders should bring their OA sashes and wear them Friday evening at the flag ceremony and campfire.

**Troop Activities:** On **Monday** evening the Senior Patrol Leader and the Scoutmaster will have the opportunity to sign up the troop for many activities. The troop activities include: Rifle, Shotgun, Archery, Swimming, Climbing Wall, Canoes, Row boats, Bouldering Wall, Kayaks, Mountain bikes as well as other activities that

may be developed between now and camp opens. The times for these events are 3:30, 4:30 and 7:00 in the evenings (**Tuesday – Thursday**).

## **OTHER INFORMATION**

### **Rest and Sleep:**

BSA standards require that 8 hours of rest be provided each camper at night. This can make a difference between a great or poor experience. Camp quiet time is from 10:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. to provide the required rest time.

### **Camp Chaplain:**

A part-time **Bishop** is available and on call at camp. The camp staff will conduct **LDS** vespers services as scheduled.

### **Troop Needs:**

Each troop and patrol should bring some of their own equipment to enable the troop to have an independent operation in its own campsite. The camp will provide tents, cots, dining tarps and Fireguard tools. The following is a recommended list of things you should bring:

10 bags of ice will be provided to the troop at no cost. Tickets will be issued at the Sunday evening Leader's meeting. Additional bags may be purchased through the Trading Post.

### **Dining Hall Procedures:**

After flag ceremony and when the Dining Hall is ready, everyone will proceed to the dining hall as directed by the Program or Camp Director. The SPL/Leaders at the table are responsible for the conduct, manners, and general supervision of the Scouts at their table.

At least one waiter is needed for each table. The waiter is to check in with the dining hall steward 15 minutes prior to the meal (Breakfast, lunch, and Evening Meal) to receive instructions and set up their tables. **PLEASE SEND EXPERIENCED WAITERS FOR FIRST 2 MEALS.** Scouting is a program for training boys, leaders **SHOULD NOT** serve as waiters. After the meal, waiters are to clean up their table, put away containers, and sweep under and around their table. When finished, the waiters are to sign out with the steward.

### **Camper Release:**

All resident camps operated under the direction of the Boy Scouts of America are required to check Scouts out of camp with adults that have been approved by the Scout's parents or guardian. This ensures that Scouts have the appropriate permission and authorization and supervision to leave camp. **THE PERSONAL SAFETY AND SECURITY OF OUR SCOUTS IS OUR #1 PRIORITY.** Scouts that will be leaving camp will only be allowed to leave with their parent/guardian or troop leaders or the adult listed on the Camper Release Form. Those leaving camp must check out with the Camp Director and logged in the visitors/check-in/check-out log in the camp office at the Administration building. The Camper Release Form must be submitted to the Camp Director prior to the Scout leaving the camp.

## Check-in Procedures

### Troop Arrival:

Troop arrival and check-in is from 8:00 a.m. – 10:00 a.m. on Monday June 22<sup>nd</sup>. All youth and leaders are to be present before the unit can check in. If a unit desires to arrive at a different day/time, they need to make prior arrangements with the Camp Director and Camp Ranger.

### Vehicles in Camp:

No personal vehicles are allowed past the parking lot. Troop trailers may be taken to the campsite, dropped off and the tow vehicle immediately returned to the parking lot. A camp trailer/shuttle will be available for transportation of equipment to and from the parking lot.

### Forms and Paperwork:

Have all required forms and medical documents filled out and completed prior to check-in. Any incomplete forms will result in delays. This includes troop roster, copy of the merit badge selections.

### Medicine:

Ensure all medications are in the original container with dosage and each person has all medications requiring medical personal to dispense be in one large zip bag.

### Merit Badge Class:

Have all classes selected 30 days prior to arrival to camp. Some classes may be cancelled due to lack of pre-registration.

\_\_\_\_ Unit Leader register with the Camp Director. At this time all youth and leaders should be on the roster with fees paid status. All outstanding fees will be paid at this time.

\_\_\_\_ The Unit Leader register with the program Director. If there are any changes to the merit badge schedule this is the time to make the changes.

\_\_\_\_ Your staff guide will assist you in getting your gear to your campsite.

\_\_\_\_ The guide will take you to your campsite and everyone should change into their swimming suits.

\_\_\_\_ The guide will take your group to the Health Lodge for medical check-in. Ensure you have all medical forms completed and **ALL** medications brought to camp. The medic may want to talk to each person if they have any questions.

\_\_\_\_ The guide will take your group to the swimming pool for swim checks.

\_\_\_\_ The guide will take your group on a tour of all the program areas, Trading Post and Dining Hall.

\_\_\_\_ When your tours are complete, proceed to your campsite and finish setting up **until lunch**.

\_\_\_\_ The tour may deviate depending on the bottle neck at the pool.

## ADVANCEMENT IN CAMP

Advancement is one of the main reasons boys stay in Scouting. The following pages should help you and your scouts develop good merit badge schedules.

### How to make sure it happens with scouts:

- Before camp, know the advancement status of each Scout.
- Set a challenging goal with each Scout.
- Keep accurate day-to-day advancement records.
- Watch the loose ends. Don't push, but do encourage.
- Each Scout is expected to bring his books to class each day.

Please pay close attention to the maturity of your Scouts as they consider which classes to take. In the chart below, the year column (Yr) should be used as a guide to finding age- and experience- appropriate program activities that will ensure your Scouts have a fun and successful summer camp.

Shotgun	9-10 2:30-3:30	2	Should be at least 5 feet tall and 100 pounds.
Archery	10-12	2	Must be 12 years old. Materials cost \$5.00.
First Aid	1:30-3:30	2	Complete all Tenderfoot thru First Class first aid requirements before camp. Bring req. 2 to camp.
Lifesaving	9-11	2	Complete req. 1a before camp. Bring long-sleeved shirt and long pants to camp.
BSA Snorkeling	1:30-2:30	2	Must be BSA Swimmer. Bring own mask, snorkel and fins.
Canoeing	1:30-3:30	2	Not for a first year scout. Must be a BSA Swimmer.
Cooking	9-10 1:30-2:30	2	Complete 2 of the 5 meals in req. 4 before camp. SM may write a letter detailing requirements completed from troop campouts.
Pioneering	11-12	2	Have good knowledge of knots before camp
Horsemanship	1:30-3:30	2	Must be 14. Bring long pants and boots or shoes with heels (no sneakers).
Weather	11-12	2	Complete req. 10 before camp.
BSA Lifeguard	9-3:30	3	Must be 14 and completed the 8 <sup>th</sup> grade. Must be a BSA Swimmer with strong swimming skills. Must have completed the Swimming, First Aid and Lifesaving merit badges. Course is all day, all week.
Emergency Prep	10-12	3	Complete req. 1 and 8c before camp. Must have completed the First Aid Merit Badge before camp. May not be able to complete at camp.
Environmental Science	9-11	3	Complete req. 3 before camp. Bring req. 4 to camp. Requires some writing.
Golf	1:30-3:30	3	MUST have own equipment and have prior experience. Two nine-hole rounds will be played (off-site).
Orienteering	11-12 2:30-3:30	3	Bring own compass.
PADI Scuba diving	9-3:30	3	Must be 15 and a BSA Swimmer with strong swimming skills. Bring own mask, snorkel and fins. Requires 8-10 hours of classroom instruction with tests and an off-site practical session. Course is all day, all week. Certification determined by course instructors.
